# BOOK REVIEW

## MALAYSIAN HEALTH CARE MALADIES AND REMEDIES

The Book ‘Malaysian Health Care Maladies and Remedies’ is a refreshing in-depth view of what ails the Malaysian health care system, offering radical solutions and remedies that need concerted efforts by all stakeholders, and a political will of honest and able leadership.

The authors trace the rise of the system right from Independence, and decline for the last two to three decades, leaving the system in a burgeoning weight of expenditure and an inappropriate supply of professionals, creaking at its seams and in danger of collapsing.

The foreword written by an eminent personality with vast experience in healthcare boldly declares, “Malaysian healthcare system is increasingly unsustainable and has become increasingly political”.

The list of authors comprises of eminent professionals and specialists in their fields with vast experience in the Malaysian healthcare system. Having spent the best part of their lives nurturing its excellence, they have gone to great lengths in revealing the truths behind its decline. Their wealth of knowledge and intellectual enquiry they bring into the more than twenty chapters is indeed awakening with shocking revelations.

The Introduction by the editors Dr Steven KW Chow and Dr Milton SW Lum is an eye opener. The bureaucratic entrenchment of the public healthcare service has largely stagnated it.

“The nation now suffers the consequences of some thoughtlessly crafted laws and policies that need immediate remedies.”



Despite the great strides we have made, there are several outstanding problems like consumer dissatisfaction. The government feels it cannot continue to spend on healthcare without some form of health financing system. And the doctors are always blamed and vilified while the public is blissfully unaware that the doctors’ fees constitute barely 20 to 25 per cent of the total bill.

The book reveals several studies conducted by the government on future healthcare, but largely remains in the closet labelled NFA (no further action). “Their damning findings considering that they are coming from government studies” make a strong case for a “Royal Commission on Healthcare”.

The unique nature of a personalised and affordable private primary care, that is obviously an asset to all Malaysians, is becoming increasingly difficult to provide amidst increasing regulations, leaving the GPs at the mercy of some HMOs. The end of the personal family doctor practice is looming in the horizon.

Too many doctors too soon, and housemen issues, with unrealistic target of doctor to population ratios, the MOH’s dilemma of a bottleneck housemanship placements problems, is severely compromising the competency and standard of care of yesteryears.

The dilemmas of issues of safety in public hospitals, the burden of regulating the practice of medicine and underregulating the business of medicine are stark revelations that few medical practitioners realise. The horizon seems bleak and a prelude to National Health Financing (NHF) and National Health Insurance (NHI) Schemes are imminent.

The authors reveal issues relating to improving patient safety and compliance to Private Healthcare Facilities and Services Act 1998, along with issues relating to safety of healthcare workers and poor maintenance of public healthcare facilities and equipment overshadowed by bureaucracy are concerns of immense magnitude that need immediate actions as revealed in the book.

Echoes from the Land Beneath the Wind and our Banjaran Titiwangsa with a saga of Broken Promises and Broken Backs, with a Disease Burden of the indigenous peoples are sagas of untold miseries unfolded in these chapters of the Maladies.

Non-communicable Diseases and Gaps in the Peka B40, beaded together, with consumers perspective of universal healthcare for all, and upgrading primary care by integrating the GP community into this healthcare ecosystem are remedies that require tertiary care from the ivory towers, which of late, unfortunately, have been embroiled in political uncertainty and degradation.

Finally a radical proposal for Malaysian healthcare by Tan Sri Dr Abu Bakar Suleiman sums it all up with a strong question “So what can we do?”

Answers that will bring about a paradigm shift, “spend more and reduce wastage” with transparency at its forefront are the suggestions. Packaged payment systems bundled together under a single fund with single payer are all radical ideas that need a strong political will more than just prescriptions

Bridging the gap between the Malaysian public and private dual dichotomic systems of healthcare is not going to be easy. Unfolding the complicated web of the two will require extremes of patience, goodwill and a stable and sane leadership.

The Book “contains fresh insights useful for solving some of Malaysia’s perennial healthcare issues”. All Malaysians including the politicians, policymakers, the public and all healthcare professionals must read the book and be involved in the process.

Some good doctors and other good intellectuals have shed sufficient light on various issues and prescribed sound prescriptions for the Malaysian healthcare maladies. However, the remedies can only come when the prescription is filled by the powers that be.

# PMPS AND PERAK DOCTORS' INITIATIVES FOR FRONTLINE HEALTHCARE WORKERS

## IN HOSPITAL RAJA PERMAISURI BAINUN IPOH (7th REPORT)

Agent of Shield Hospital Raja Permaisuri Bainun (AOS-HRPB) was initiated by YB Dr Lee Boon Chye on 23 Mar 2020 to support HRPB frontliners battling the COVID-19 pandemic.

Many expressions below are from colleagues in the AOS WhatsApp Group. We are grateful for their participation and their self-sacrificing effort to combat the pandemic.

### Recap

Malaysian government started loosening of SOPs for COVID fully vaccinated individuals on 10/8. Healthcare frontliners were very anguished by this after sacrificing so much battling the COVID scourge since the spike in June 2021. Highly transmissible and more virulent Delta VOC surfaced in May / June. National average daily new COVID cases and deaths climbed to 20,636 and 245 in August. Perak's full COVID vaccination rate reached only 20% in early August.

### Daily New Cases, Malaysia, 2020 – 2/12/2021




### August-September Crisis

As Greater Klang Valley's daily number of cases began falling in mid-August, Perak went into its own crisis with number rising to above 1,000, accompanied by similar trend in Sabah, Kedah, Johor, Kelantan and Pulau Pinang.

National average daily number of new cases reached 20,363 for August, dropped to 16,629 for September, to October's 7,289 and November's 5,371.

National average daily number of deaths reached 245 in August, rose to 322 in September, then came down dramatically with massive vaccination to 83 in October, and to 50 in November.

But national number of infected children increased hugely, resulting in 41 fatalities under 17 during the period 1/1 - 30/8/2021, compared to six throughout 2020. This trend together with increasing prevalence of Delta variant urged initiation of COVID vaccination for the younger age-group. The need of booster for those fully vaccinated also became apparent.

### HRPB / Perak

Just before mid-August HRPB opened up a huge COVID ward at old maternity block and extended existing medical HDU, in its continuous process of adaptation to battle the pandemic.

Some patients needed to be discharged with oxygen concentrators. Many patients (including young ones) suffered long COVID with damaged lungs.

Many Orang Asli became infected with some deaths among them.

Meanwhile HRPB reported many cases of readmissions for multiorgan inflammation, for even low-category young patients. Subsequently the number of new cases among children began to increase. The importance of vaccination for people of wider age range became apparent. Covid vaccination for teenagers (12 - 17) began in late September.


Walk-in vaccination was started on 2/9 for citizens above age 40 in Ipoh and Batu Gajah. By 13/9 all 15 PPVs (Pusat Pemberian Vaksin) throughout Perak offered walk-in vaccination for Perakians above 18.

Healthcare workers (HCWs) involved in the massive vaccination drive laboured hard and weathered challenges which were traumatic at times. PMPs members volunteered to help out. Their efforts were instrumental in bringing the pandemic under rein sooner, hence reducing morbidity, mortality, and even preventing emergence of new variants.

Daily New Cases – Perak, 1/12/2021

Vaccination rate raced to peak on 2/9. Daily number of new cases raged to peak at 1,596 on 17/9, fell below 1,000 towards October and below 300 in November.

## Donations

HRPB's capacity was severely stressed. Help continued from AOS, Mr Kwan (Dr Ko Chun Sen's friend), and Perak Chinese Chamber of Commerce and Industry (PCCCI, through intermediary of Dr Wong Chong Yuen).

Total fund donated by AOS members stood at about RM187,000 on 22/8 with RM171,000 already used.

Mr Kwan donated four units of monitors at RM5k per set.

HRPB's Department of Cardiology requested donation of air purifiers for their central-airconditioned Cardiology Wards. AOS raised a further RM 12,500 to help meet their need to prevent indoor transmission.

Slim River Hospital (SRH) also received oxygen regulators and trolleys. Balance of AOS fund was RM 1,798.53 on 23/9.



21/8, AOS donated 4 sets of 47-L tanks & trolleys to HRPB



1/9, PCCCI donated to HRPB 5 mobile twin-oxygen-cylinder trolley, 6 units of 47-L oxygen tanks, 2 sets of infusion pumps & 10 units of CPAP hoods

23/9, AOS delivered 5 units of air purifiers to Dept of Cardiology, HRPB

## Vaccination, Breakthroughs, Booster

Real world data indicated drop of immunity among vaccinated people and breakthrough infections surfaced across the world with Delta variant.

Global daily new cases and deaths have bottomed and started moving up again around third week in October.

Perak started giving booster to HCWs from 15/10 before many other states.

## Future

Bloomberg News Wire suggested on 12/9/2021 “With the virus still spreading out of control in vast swathes of the planet, another novel variant could quite feasibly emerge.” Since 24/11 multiple countries reported cases of the new highly transmissible Omicron variant. Many unknowns about it await to be unmasked.

A comforting point is that COVID deaths during Delta surge are rare among the fully vaccinated especially if they are without weakened immunity. This is improved further by the booster, which likely will have similar protection against another VOC (variant of concern). New anti-viral drugs are also being identified.

Personal and public preventive measures remain paramount.

Youthful frontliners are our ‘Legenda’ for the future.

The appeal, however, is subjected to consideration by the MMC Council.

### CPD Points for Participation in COVID-19 Related Activities

Registered Medical Practitioners mobilised to health facilities providing services related to the management of COVID-19 during the COVID-19 pandemic are eligible to claim CPD points under category A3 (g, h, i) which are Work-based Learning-Short Courses / Attachment.

This claim must be furnished with a Letter of Appointment, Instruction, Mobilisation or Invitation and can only be made once in one CPD cycle year. Relevant claims for CPD points can be made through the respective CPD administrator.

### **E-CERTIFICATE FOR SPECIALIST REGISTRATION WITH NATIONAL SPECIALIST REGISTER, MALAYSIAN MEDICAL COUNCIL**

#### **Preamble**

According to Section 14C Medical Act 1971 [Act A1443] (Amendment 2012), it is MANDATORY for Medical Specialists practicing in Malaysia to register in the NSR/MMC. NSR/MMC awards a 'Certificate of Specialist Registration' to those who have registered and listed.

MMC has certified that NSR e-certificate downloaded and printed out from the NSR online system is valid document for use. However, practitioners may request for a sealed hardcopy certificate of their specialist registration from the MMC with a fee of RM200 per copy.©
